

The Levy Building Legacy

Between 1979 and 1981, representatives from five organizations--the Hammond Art Guild, Columbia Theatre Players, Hammond Arts Council, Central Business District Association, and Hammond Heritage Foundation--came together to create the Hammond Cultural Foundation, an umbrella organization unifying the existing cultural and educational organizations. One of their first tasks was to secure a space for art shows, plays and musical performances, and classroom and workshop space. Fortunately, they found a space that would meet their needs.

Built circa 1916, the Levy Building initially served as a meeting place for the Woodmen of the World fraternal organization and later as Levy's Department Store. The donation of the building to the City of Hammond by the Levy Family in 1980 ensured a permanent home for what would eventually become the Hammond Regional Arts Center.

Levy building opens new era

In 1978, Alyce Levy closed Levy's Store, one of Thomas Street's oldest businesses, but this year the Levy Building begins a new career.

Donated to the city, the building is the new home of the recently-formed Hammond Cultural Foundation and will present art exhibits, dance performances, plays, workshops, music recitals, flower shows, art classes and competitions, theater workshops, poetry readings, photography exhibits and costume displays.

The building also will house an art library. Overseen by a 13-member board, the Levy Building officially opens as the Hammond Cultural Foundation's headquarters next Wednesday with a ribbon cutting and open house from 5 to 7 p.m.

The open house will feature displays of antique quilts, needlework, flower arrangements, an art exhibit and refreshments.

At 8:30 p.m. there will be a reception for members.

Next Thursday, there will be an evening of music beginning at 8 p.m. featuring a clarinet ensemble, a woodwind ensemble and a student brass ensemble.

A comic opera, "Sweet Betsy From Pike," also will be presented.

Friday, April 23 brings an evening of dance to the Levy Building beginning at 8 p.m. It will include square dancing by the Tangi Taws and Paws, modern dance by the Joan Grosch Dance Troupe and singing by the Hammond High School Vocal Ensemble.

On Saturday, April 24, activities begin at 2 p.m. with poetry readings by Hammond High School students and a poetry reading and presentation competition.

At 8 p.m. there will be two.





A Beaux Arts Ball in the fall featured a play, music, and fabulous costumes.





Twenty Louisiana artists, including Gloria Ross and Roy Blackwood, were featured in the first exhibition, *Elevated Gesture*.



The Center hosted a play for Hammond's Heritage Day, the first of many theatrical offerings to follow.





The Hammond Regional Arts Center will present the first Marjorie Morrison Sculpture Biennial honoring longtime Louisiana arts advocate Marjorie Morrison of Hammond with an opening reception on Friday from 6 to 8 p.m.

Fourteen works from 11 Louisiana artists were selected by juror Rose Courville, former curator of exhibitions at the Acadiana Center for the Arts in Lafayette.

This exhibition represents a statewide grouping of contemporary sculpture in Louisiana, with artists' works from St. Charles, Monroe, Youngsville, New Orleans, Slidell, Folsom, Covington and Hammond.

The exhibition runs from Friday through Nov. 14.

The opening reception from 6 to 8 p.m. on Friday features a wine and martini bar. This exhibition is co-sponsored by The Oak Street Gallery and Macaluso and Jordan Attorneys of Hammond.




2012

A Kids Drama Camp joined the roster of art camps, concluding with the production of a play.






